How does the Korean Peninsula matter for European and Indo-Pacific security? This panel seeks to discuss how the Korean Peninsula fits into broader cross-regional (i.e. Indo-Pacific and Euro-Atlantic) strategic debates. The panel will ponder how intra-regional and cross-regional calculations may impinge on how certain actors, including the United States and Europe, may approach the Korean Peninsula both in peacetime (deterrence) and wartime. The panellists will identify and discuss key trade-offs and dilemmas, and thus address how Korea-related developments may impinge on regional and global security and vice versa.
